The celebration of St Patrick's Day, the Patron Saint of Ireland, recently took place on Wednesday 17th March and commemorates the death of St Patrick which was thought to be on that day in 431AD.

In her Wednesday Meditation, Jean Young described how, as a 16-year old, he had been captured by Irish pirates from his home (in Scotland?) and taken to Ireland as a slave! There he worked as a shepherd for 6 years and it was then that he became more aware of spirituality and, in particular, Christianity.

He successfully escaped and made his way home, only to hear "a voice" telling him to return to Ireland as a missionary – and the rest, as they say, is history!

I did not know that St Patrick had been a slave when young and nor was I aware that in the national flag of Ireland (the Irish Tricolour) the green stripe stands for Irish Catholicism, the orange stripe represents Irish Protestantism and the central white stripe represents the hope for peace between the two groups.

Here is now an old Irish Blessing:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me' Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort me and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger. At the Kirk Session meeting last week I outlined what we may do to celebrate St.Matthew's 150th Anniversary.

A small team has volunteered to coordinate the events. This team will need to enlist the help of the organisations and others to organise the different elements of the year. Please be willing to support this year making it one to be remembered for St.Matthew's. The one when hopefully we welcome a new minister to our Congregation.

The Kirk Session duly met with the Presbytery's Vacancy Advisory Committee last Monday 15th March and thereafter we are conducting a mandatory Kirk Session vote as to whether St Matthew's will "depart" from the Church's traditional view on "same sex" relationships in the context of our new prospective Minister, whoever that may be. and well. You will be like garden that has plenty of water, like a spring of water that never runs dry.

Grow your own Tatties

Potatoes are one of the most rewarding and easy veg even if you don't have a garden because you can grow them in a tub as long as they are outside.

Now is the time to buy seed potatoes (these look like normal potatoes but have been prepared specially for growing and are virus free).

They are split in to 3 main groups,

1st earlies, 2nd earlies and maincrop. This describes how long the plants will take to mature.

1st Earlies can crop in about 12-14 weeks so you can have a crop by June. Varieties include: Pentland Javelin, Arran Pilot and Sharpe's Express.

2nd Earlies take a couple of weeks longer so are usually ready about July. Varieties include: Maris Peer, Charlotte and Vivaldi.

Maincrops take longer to mature so are ready late Aug/Sept. Varieties include: Rooster, King Edward and Golden Wonder.

The earlies need to be started in to growth using a process called 'chitting' All this means is that the potatoes are laid out in a tray (egg boxes are good for this) in a light frost free place and the wee eyes (buds) on them start to develop in to tiny shoots. This allows them to have a good head start when they are planted. It will take 2 or 3 weeks for them to chit so get them going now.

For planting be careful not to knock the shoots off. If they are going in a tub or a bag make sure it is at least 30cm deep by 30cm wide. Place the potatoes shoot up on a thick layer of multi purpose or veg compost then cover them well. As they grow you can add more compost to cover the stems until the tub/bag is full. Covering the stems as they grow also protects them from frost. Water well and let them get on with it!

If they are going in the ground dig a trench about 25cm deep and sprinkle in a general fertiliser then place the tatties in the bottom about 25-30cm apart with the shoots upwards. Cover them over and as they grow pull the soil up over the stems to avoid the

developing potatoes going green if they are exposed to light.

Anyone can have a go and kids will love this as it is always such a great surprise to see what has grown, especially if they are in a pot and you can have a great potato unveiling by emptying the pot when they are ready!

a gift to each Guild member. Many of my embroidery friends set themselves challenges and this was mine.

The Guild National Council has been meeting by zoom, and also Guilds Together Perth & Kinross met last Friday, the 12th, to pass on reports and assure us that plans are going ahead for next session.

The Guild projects for the last 3 years come to an end soon, and the totals were given to us last week. Crossreach: £97,972.06, The Sailors' Society: £78,837.39, The Boys' Brigade: £90,539.78, World Mission: £75,802.64, Malawi Fruits: £81,374.02, Free to Live Trust: £92,327.71.

As a Guild we were not able to fundraise for our chosen charity this past year, or to hear the presentation which had been planned for last October, however if you feel you would like to contribute a little to any of the projects before they finish you could pass something on to me or Jean McIntyre via the church letter box.

Next year's projects will be presented at a zoom meeting on 23rd April, so if you can link in to this let me know and I will make sure you get the codes.

Also planned ahead are dates for the Annual Gathering for which the Caird Hall has been booked for Saturday 4th September 2021, and the Christmas Big Sing in Glasgow Tron Kirk on 3rd December. Both of these are of course dependent on Covid restrictions being lifted.

It would be good to think that by September we might be able to meet properly in our church building as St Matthews Guild. This is Covid dependent, but keep your prayers going and fingers crossed that next winter will be more normal than the one just over.



WHAT ARE YOU READING?

This week Janet Martin writes about: 'Katharina Luther – Nun, rebel, wife' *by Anne Boileau.*



This is the story of Martin Luther's wife Katharina von Bora and her journey from being a nun to marrying the man who caused religious upheaval in 1517 by pinning 95 theses to the Castle Church door in Wittenberg criticising the Roman Catholic Church.

Boileau uses Katharina's own diary (written when she was confined to bed awaiting her first child) to tell us the story in her own words. Katharina born into an aristocratic family is sent away to a convent school at an early age and then enters the convent to become a nun. In time, she becomes disillusioned with her Catholic faith and after hearing about the rise of the new Protestant Faith, plans her escape. This is dangerous for both her and the other nuns, who became fugitives in a world where the disruption of the Reformation was taking place.

What is obvious is that Katharina, is a very strong character and it is her strong personality and the strength of her faith that sees her through the turbulent times when her life is in danger prior to her marriage. The book is written in an easy-going style which describes not only spiritual and social currents set flowing by Luther, but Katharina's personal journey and her intimate insights into the hidden personality of the great theologian himself. It is obvious that they were both determined characters and although his strength is required to push forth his vision of a church ruled by Christ, not Rome; her strength is required to maintain the household where endless scholars and visitors come to hear the philosophy of the great man himself. The writer pulls together a fascinating picture of 16th Century Saxony, describing how they lived off the land throughout the seasons. Growing most of the food and meat they consume as well as upon the local agriculture. Ways, that we in our industrial society are now beginning to realise are more sustainable than our 'global' food production and all its negative results.

This tale of courtship and marriage between a courageous ex-nun and a learned, but temperamental ex-monk with a vivid mission to change the Christian world, made a fascinating and easy read and I thoroughly recommend it.
