Dear All

A recent Meditation by Marjorie Clark centred around refugees and asylum seekers as Refugee Week is a UK-wide festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary. Founded in 1998 and held every year around World Refugee Day on the 20 June, Refugee Week is also a growing global movement.

Refugee Week's vision is for refugees and asylum seekers to be able to "live safely within inclusive and resilient communities, where they can continue to make a valuable contribution."

The Bible itself does not use the word "refugee" but there are certainly many references in the Bible to welcoming the stranger in your midst and loving your neighbour as yourself.

In the light of these Biblical exhortations, the Church of Scotland has recently signed 2 open letters to the UK Government asking, firstly, for a "fairer and more humane asylum system in partnership with devolved governments" and, secondly, stating that the UK proposals, set out in a recent consultation paper entitled the "New Plan for Immigration" will cause harm and suffering and breach the obligations of the UN refugee convention.

A new campaign called "Together with Refugees" was launched by the Asylum Reform Initiative on 10 May and is backed by the Church of Scotland.

On a more positive note - I'm sure, like me, you were delighted to read in the headlines recently that:

"The orphaned son of an asylum seeker who has lived under the threat of deportation for 10 years has been told he can stay permanently in the UK."

The article continued with the story of Giorgi Kakava, 13, who has finally been granted the right to remain indefinitely by the Home Office which means he can continue living in Glasgow for as long as he wants.

I am proud to say that this case was championed by Rev Brian Casey, Minister of Springburn Parish Church, who lobbied the UK and Scottish governments and launched an online petition which attracted 92,650 signatures.



Summer Houseplant Care

After one of the wettest Mays on record, the



clouds have parted and the sun has finally decided to make an appearance, meaning Summer has arrived! Although houseplants need light and warmth to survive, too much of a good thing can be damaging to their health, leaving them with droopy stems and brown, shrivelled leaves. If these signs are left to worsen, your plants could even be at risk of dying completely.

As a result, it's important to keep an eye on your houseplants during any periods of heat like the one we're predicted to experience over the coming weeks and make sure you adapt your plant care routine to ensure they stay happy and healthy despite the change in conditions. I like to dust off my houseplants and take them outside for a summer clean. Gently spray them with water to clean the leaves and then water them well before you take them back inside. If they are in a South facing window it may be necessary to move them to a slightly shadier spot in the peak of the summer, they won't dry out so fast.

Indoor plants, just as their outdoor counterparts, need to be fertilized to stay healthy. Think of fertilizer as the other half of your potting soil. When potting soil is fresh, your plants won't need much – if any – fertilizing. This is especially true with modern, fortified potting soil which has fertilizer mixed in. After about two months, however, the plant will have consumed the nutrients in the soil so you'll have to fertilize it if you want continued, healthy growth. I use a liquid houseplant feed every 2 weeks until September.

You can tell if the plant needs repotted if the roots are showing at the base of the pot or coming out of the top of the pot. Just use a pot the next size up. There are plenty of houseplant composts to choose from and most foliage plants will do well in these. If you do have cacti or orchids though try to get their specific compost as the drainage is much more open.

Your plants deserve the best of care!

It started in 1991, when we first arrived in Scotland after very hot days and nights in Wiltshire and Buckinghamshire where we visited Wolfgang's relatives. As we were bound to book holidays during the school breaks, we were very glad to find a cooler destination (next stops would have been Iceland or Greenland). We staved for a week in a nice B&B at Pitcullen Crescent and, oh boy, everything was so overwhelming: the beauty of the different landscapes, the interesting sightseeing, the weather and most of all the friendly people, which we met on tours, in B&Bs and in pubs (!). So for the next years we behaved like good tourists, visiting castles, palaces, museums, galleries... in and around Perth. By then we stayed for a fortnight.

And then came 1995. On the 7th of July we decided that now we could dare to join in a full Sunday service. So after a long breakfast and a longer chat with our hosts we went to the nearest church which was Kinnoull Parish Church. But the service had already started and the doors were closed. We went down to the riverbank and suddenly we heard church bells (we now think it must have been St. John's), saw that the doors of the church with the high steeple were still open, dashed over the bridge and entered St. Matthew's. Again we were overwhelmed: the extreme friendly welcoming at the door and cheerful service and the joyful hymns. The service was conducted by a locum minister because Ewen Gilchrist was on holiday. Due to this delightful experience we came back the next Sunday and were on the hook again. Since then we planned our holidays with the most amount of services possible. Sometimes we were even in St. Matthew's twice a day.

So this was the unexpected turn for you being stuck with us and the unexpected turn for us encountering the pleasure of worshipping in different but also familiar ways. Now we could start to tell 37 or more chapters about unexpected events connected to the story above: from

meeting people, developing friendships, still visiting sites, exploring every nook and cranny (including beaches, restaurants, bookshops and ice-cream parlours) staying in beautiful flats for 4 weeks up to enjoying zooming into Sunday services and chats. Hope to haste us back to Perth in summer 2022. Beware!
