Presbytery Planning and Development have been very busy over the last 3 months drafting the proposals for the future of church in Perth Presbytery.

At the Presbytery Meeting on Saturday 12th February the report will be discussed and the programme of consultation revealed. This is a challenging time for the church as Presbyteries have been instructed by the General Assembly to reduce the numbers of Ministers by approximately 33%, at the same time keeping Mission to the front of their thoughts. This is not an easy task given the geography of the Presbytery.

A resume of the Presbytery meeting as it directly affects St.Matthew's and the city of Perth will be included in the next Newsletter but in the meantime please include those who have been given this task In your prayers.


COVID omicron

Stock levels at the Foodbank fluctuate and at the moment we are appealing particularly for tinned or instant potatoes, small bags of rice, tinned vegetables, tinned tomatoes, cooking sauces and jam. Toiletries, washing up liquid and other such non-food necessities are always welcome too.

Janet's Jottings

I enjoyed Alison Notman's sermon about the TV Programme The Repair Shop as she preached in the Rev. Fiona Bullock to St Matthew's. I too am a



fan of the show and while watching it the previous week had been thinking that I could use it as a basis for Janet's Jottings.

I am always moved to see the articles that are taken in for repair. They are mostly on first sight, ordinary everyday things. It soon emerges, that they are very precious items, once loved and treasured but now falling apart from years of neglect, or perhaps having lain broken in pieces after some traumatic accident.

It intrigues me that despite the state of disrepair, these items have never been thrown out. Even smashed to smithereens, or worn out with persistent use to the extent they look totally irreparable. Folks have hung on to them, because they have meaning and value. Rarely is it a monetary value.

In all cases, there is a memory of how well they worked in the past and the joy that they brought to the owner, as well as the influence they had on the lives of others.

Despite their brokenness, the items have been kept in readiness and hope for a day of renewal and repair.

With the ups and downs of our own lives, Many of us might feel that we resemble some of those items. We may be physically struggling with ill health, bits not working like they used to, seized up, creaking joints or perhaps worn out with age or excessive use!

Our mental health may be in tatters and hanging by a thread; just ready to snap if one more burden or stress is placed up on us.

Or maybe our spiritual health has taken a knocking. What was previously sound and sure in years gone by, is now fraying at the edges and maybe even paper thin and possibly even developing holes in it. We know we want to believe and all the component parts are still there, they just don't all seem to be properly glued together, lacking strength and resilience. So many different bits needing attention, that it is hard to know where to start.

This is where we need to get ourselves along to God's Repair Shop! The doors to God's Repair Shop are permanently open and we are reminded of this in Matthew Chapter 11 v 28 where He says "Come to me all of you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest......"

In the 'Message' it's straight to the point "Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me — watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly."

When we enter His repair shop, the treatment we undergo is probably not that much different to the TV show. Only we have to be humble enough to allow Him to get on with the job. For Him to strip our faith back to its bare bones, assess the damage and then trust that He will use all the appropriate tools to start the rebuilding process. In this repair process we have to trust in God as He begins his assessment. On his work bench we find rest. Much needed rest from our daily labours, but also rest from the introspective work of analysing our faith, proving our righteousness and constantly aiming to walk the Christian path. Because we are in His hands undergoing repairs, we can just BE......

Be at peace with God, be at peace with ourselves. Be accepting of God's repair plan for us.

Once we succumb to his workbench and the tools of His grace, His love will help to mend our weaknesses and flaws, nurture and strength will flow into our damaged souls and renew our faith to carry on for years to come.

However, God tells us that we also have a duty to look out for other 'broken vessels'. In mending us he has then charged us to reach out to other damaged souls whose faiths are fractured, or lamps that have lost their ability to shine and need one of us to light the way to salvation. We can help carry those whose damaged lives are in pieces and locked in a box waiting for someone to carefully reconstruct them,

God's Repair Shop is open to all.



I have just had the unenviable task of clearing out the Traidcraft cupboard; like everything else, in March 2020, our stall came to an abrupt halt, and although one or two regular customers continued to request some items, basically our trading stopped. The result is that, two years on, much of our stock is out of date, or past its 'best before date.'

Rather than put it all immediately into landfill, we would like, for the next few weeks, to have a table somewhere in St Matthew's where all of this produce can be displayed, and people can help themselves (obviously at their own risk) to anything they feel they could use.

The items - free to a good home - include: various kinds of biscuits, muesli, Penne and Fusilli pasta, brown rice, sugar (raw cane and demerara), tea (Earl Grey and Breakfast), instant coffee and ground coffee, hot chocolate, raisins, sultanas, and mixed dried fruit, LOTS of bars of chocolate, both big and small and various flavours, sweeties, jam and marmalade. I have it on the best authority (from those who have tried them) that the biscuits and chocolate still taste as good as normal. And even if you don't feel ready to eat things, perhaps they could be used in baking, or feeding the birds – I am sure there will be other uses that folk can think of!

Please look out for this display – and if you can't get to church but would like something, please contact me and we will endeavour to get items to you. We hope to restock and be up and running again sometime soon, especially as Fair Trade Fortnight is looming (February 21st – 6th March.)

We are proud to be a Fair Trade Church, and are committed to continue our support for farmers and producers overseas by paying realistic prices for their produce. Thank you for your support in the past, and we hope to welcome you again to our Traidcraft stall, once we have restocked.

PILGRIM'S WAY WALK



St. Matthew's Church

As indicated in the last Newsletter, for the second section of the

Pilgrim's Way we walked from Dunfermline Abbey back to Torryburn, a distance of about 6 miles.

We started by walking through Pittencrieff Park to the Abbey where we were given some historical pointers by a guide from Historic Environment Scotland. Dunfermline is second only to St Andrews in Fife as a pilgrim destination and the present Abbey was built between 1128 and 1150 by David 1 with Queen Margaret's relics being moved there in 1250. There are various mentions of miracles associated with her relics so that she was canonised by the Pope then.

From the time of Margaret and Malcolm, Dunfermline Abbey became the main mausoleum for Scottish monarchs, many of whom lived in the royal palace which was established alongside the monastery.

Robert the Bruce is one such monarch buried in Dunfermline Abbey Church (minus his heart which is buried in Melrose Abbey) and its architect, William Burn, adorned the parapet of the church tower with the words "King Robert the Bruce" in giant letters of stone- an early example of advertising!

As someone who had never been inside the Abbey, I was fascinated by some of the massive pillars which were beautifully decorated in a way I had not seen before.

Although the weather forecast was not favourable, we then set out for Torryburn via Crossford and Cairneyhill and stopped first for a quick cuppa outside at Knockhouse Farm where we were taken by a row of cows who were fascinated by us!

Our lunch stop was at Fairleys Garden Centre at Cairneyhill, a family-run garden centre, where we were warmly welcomed and sat undercover outside to enjoy a spot of lunch.

We then completed our walk at Torryburn – and discovered how we had gone wrong on the first walk when we spotted a broken "Pilgrim's Way" sign which did not point us in the correct direction! At Torryburn it was interesting to read about the witch, Lilias Adie, who had been buried there. Adie was born in approximately 1640 and she lived in Torryburn where she died in 1704. In the early 1700s, a witch hysteria had swept over Fife periods. Furthermore Adie seems to have been 'at risk' of an accusation. Women accused of witchcraft were typically different, older, lived alone or failed to fit into the societal norms and

expectations of their time. Adie, who was over 60 at the time of her accusation and arrest, fit into the age category.

Like many other accused, after a month in prison, Adie confessed to being a witch. She told her captors that she met the devil in a cornfield at sunset. She is remembered for her 'courage' as she refused to identify any other women as witches.

She was subsequently sentenced to be burned at the stake. This was the preferred method of killing a 'witch' as it was feared that the devil could reanimate a witch's body and allow them to exact revenge on the living.

However, Lilias Adie died before she could make it to the stake. To avoid "reanimation", she was buried in between high and low water mark, in a simple wooden box, with a large stone (weighing approximately half a ton) placed on top. This way, they thought that if she did reanimate then at least she wouldn't be able to get out. This burial has huge significance for Scotland, and is partly the reason that Adie has been noticed to such an extent as it is utterly unique in that it is the only known witch burial in Scotland. All the other known 'witches' were burned, as was the custom.

All in all this was a walk with several points of interest – and we escaped the worst of the weather so were very lucky!


