The future of the Church in Perth Presbytery

On Saturday 11th February the Rev Allan Wilson, Convenor of the Planning and Development Committee of Perth Presbytery presented his Interim Report on the Presbytery Mission Plan.

Following some years of unsuccessful attempts to adjust the numbers of ministers in presbyteries the Faith Nurture Forum with the Approval of the General Assembly instructed Presbyteries to reduce the numbers of ministers by 2025. In doing so presbyteries were advised of the permissible number of ministers allocated. For Perth Presbytery this meant a reduction from 26 Full Time Equivalent ministers to 16.5 FTE. A reduction of 37%.

The Planning and Development Committee spent approximately 600 hours in discussion, investigation and examination of the Charges. Charges were requested to return a questionnaire, referred to as a Toolkit. This toolkit supplied to the committee not only statistical information of numbers and finance but information on the health of the congregation, its outreach, its mission.

These Toolkits were the core of our discussions together with substantial local knowledge.

During the time of preparation of the report the committee have had to maintain a very high level of confidentiality, as not only were we working on assessing places where members have worshipped for many years, but we were discussing the future employment of ministers. This has been very stressful for the Committee who only now are able to talk about the report with family, friends and colleagues.

You will note this is an Interim Report. We now move into an 8 week consultation period during which Kirk Sessions are asked to look closely at the plan and think positively and prayerfully about how it can be implemented in their congregation and Network of Congregations. During this period of time the Planning &Development Committee seek to discuss the Plan with Kirk Sessions before setting out to finalise the report.

The Report will not only have to be approved at Presbytery but will be looked at by representatives of the Faith Nurture Forum.

In parallel with this there is also an instruction from the General Trustees that a survey of all properties is done and reported on. A Property Toolkit has been prepared for this and will be coming our way shortly.

What does this Interim Report on the Presbytery Mission Plan mean for St Matthew's Church?

As Tom said, every congregation across the Presbytery will be affected by the proposals. In terms of ministry allocation, St Matthew's Church will retain 1.0 full time equivalent – currently me. However, this will include increased responsibilities in pastoral care and mission.

We are being encouraged to work more closely with our neighbours, which can only be a good thing for the city centre and for us. We will work closely with the pastoral team at St John's, learning from each other, as we seek to provide pastoral care across the two parishes. This may result in an increase in the number of bereaved families I'll work alongside to prepare funerals but it may also represent an opportunity for others within our congregations to train for such a worthwhile and treasured ministry.

St John's, the North Church and St Matthew's will work together to maintain and develop our city centre mission, enabling us to share our resources, our vision and our passion. We have different identities and might even have different ways of doing things but we can use these to reach out to more people together. We will explore ways of working ecumenically too (that is to say, we'll work with other religious communities locally where possible).

This is an important time of change in the life of the Church of Scotland. Through it all, I encourage you to pray. Please pray for all those who have given their time and their energy into putting together the interim report. Please pray for all congregations across the Presbytery as we now discuss how to take change forward. Please pray for our friends and neighbours across the Presbytery who are hurting and angry about difficult decisions. Please pray that we will have our eyes fixed on Jesus and our hands ready to serve those in need, as part of the Church of

Scotland, regardless of our particular congregations or parishes.

Please read the report and watch Allan Wilson's presentation, if you can. These decisions are being made in a context of necessity. For too long as a church we have put off making difficult decisions, hoping for a brighter day. I still believe that a brighter day will come but the time to act is now so that we ensure that the Church of Scotland is a church for the future. It will take all of us together so Elders, members, adherents, anyone who claims St Matthew's or St John's as their church or other places throughout the Presbytery – let's talk and listen to each other, our concerns and our dreams, our hurts and our hopes. We're going to make space in one or two of our services to have these conversations and someone might have suggested doing this over lunch at some point – we are all about the food at St Matthew's, after all! Don't let this stop you chatting to each other now. As a Kirk Session, we are committed to listening to your thoughts and keeping you informed about developments so talk to us too.

This is your church, our church, and the future of the church depends on us, just as it did the first disciples who reached out beyond their comfort zones, but always guided by their Lord, Jesus. May we know his guiding hand in these next steps on our journey.

DR ELSIE INGLIS- advance notice!

At the moment we are working on bringing some Speakers to our church to talk about Dr Elsie Inglis. Hopefully, some of you will know her work as a remarkable pioneering doctor who didn't "Sit Still". When she volunteered to work as a doctor in WW1 this was how the War Office responded to her!

A skilled physician and surgeon, much revered and praised by her patients, she overcame considerable opposition to women doctors and other barriers throughout her life. She raised huge amounts of money for the Scottish Women's Hospitals and is more



widely commemorated in Serbia (where she worked instead in WW1) than in Scotland..

An amazing statistic is that there are more statues to animals in Edinburgh than to women so there is a campaign at the moment to raise funds to erect a statue in her honour.

Various events are happening in March – see www.elsieinglis.org and we would like to hold some in our church as well later in the year. Watch this space!

Meditation by Allan Kelman, a member of our Wednesday Meditation Group

The Rs of Worship and Recycling...! Psalm 24:1-10

If you think back a few years maybe you can remember what it was like to throw cans, and plastic, and cardboard cereal boxes into the normal rubbish bin. Remember when we used to do that...

We've come to the realisation that if we want to be better stewards of the creation, if we want to make difference in our world, we can start by taking cans, plastic and cardboard and recycling them. Recycling has become a normal part of life for us now, it feels wrong to throw a can or a newspaper in the green bin, instead of looking for a recycling container to put it in.

And this has happened because we have been educated about the importance of recycling and the difference it can make in using our limited resources.

And recycling is more than just sorting out our household rubbish isn't it - it's really a lifestyle, a way of living that focuses on **Reducing**, **Reusing**, and **Recycling** – the Rs.

When I saw this the recently, I thought that this was a very biblical way of thinking really... and Psalm 24:1 which begins by stating – The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it;

So, if this world does belong to God – all of it and everything and everyone in it - and if there is a way of living which helps us to be good stewards and caretakers of the earth, if there is something we can do to save the world, then surely, we should do it - right?

Have we ever considered that a lifestyle of "worship" might be just the thing to help save our world?

Some people think of worship as something we do on Sunday morning, which involves prayer, singing and a sermon, and hopefully this doesn't take longer than an hour – heaven help me if this takes longer than 12 minutes...!

Or, we might say that worship is the feeling of adoration and devotion that we express to Christ while we sing to Him. And these experiences of worship are perfectly correct and wonderful, singing in particular.

But this isn't really the full experience of worship that the *bible* wants us to have.

And it's not really the kind of worship that will help save our world.

So, what does Psalm 24 have to say to us about worship. It tells us that worship is a lifestyle – just like recycling is. And to help us grasp what it means to understand worship as a lifestyle, to help worship become a part of our everyday life it gives us the Rs of worship.

Reason, Requirements, and Results.
Remembering we've also had the R's of recycling Reducing, Reusing, and Recycling
Now we have the Reason, Requirements, and
Results.

So, the <u>Reason</u> why we worship is first, and this focuses on the foundations of what God intended for worship to be.

Let's look at vs. 1-2 of the Psalm.

The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; for he founded it on the seas and established it on the waters.

Why do we worship? Because everything belongs to God! Doesn't it?

What a huge claim this verse makes —everything in existence belongs to God...?!

Now, we often think about how "nature" – the rocks and trees the sky and seas belong to God - but what about cities, and houses? What about theatres, parks, schools? What about abstract things like art, and what about the internet?

These are all part of God's creation and they all belong to God as well – don't they?

Surely, if a lifestyle of worship means that we begin to look at everything around us in this way, then all these things do belong to God. Yes? No?

If you're anything like me, and I'm always **very** happy to admit this, then I think this is a very, very difficult concept to grasp.

It's kind of like looking at something to see if it can be recycled – you know when you look for the Recycling symbol on it. Lifestyle worship begins to see the first R of worship – The **Reas**on - stamped on to everything around us.

Now there are two very important words in verse two - founded, and established. Elsewhere in scripture these two words are used to describe the building of cities, and temples. So, when they are used here to describe how God created the earth, the Bible is telling us that when God created the world, he was creating a very big temple — or an environment where worship can take place.

Now we still might think that worship is only prayer, singing and sermons, but not according to this Psalm. Not a bit of it...! This is telling us that everything belongs to Him.

Again, If someone had said this to me years ago, I would have been totally confused, and as I said, I sort of still am.

In verses 3-4, it reminds us that there are **Requirements** for worship. It asks the question - Who

has the right to go up the Lord's hill and who can enter? The answer is those who have clean hands and a pure heart. Those who have not given themselves to an idol, or swear by what is false - if you meet these requirements –then come on in.

It's quite the questionnaire isn't it ...?!

Do we think that we meet these requirements? Do we have clean Hands – In other words are our lives characterised by the right actions and do we do the right thing?

Do we have a pure Heart – In connection with clean hands this is speaking about the motivation for our actions?

And it's not enough to just do the right thing – we must have the right motives too.

The bible reveals to us that the root problem in our world is Sin and how it affects those whom God has called to rule over the creation. Change that, and you change the world!

Imagine how many wars would stop if governments were honouring Christ instead of themselves. Imagine where the Russian/Ukrainian crisis would be now if they honoured Christ and not themselves...?

But what of the **Results**? What's in it for me?!

Worship that can save the world – that's the **Result**. In finishing, let's pray that we will become as affected by the **Rs** of worship as we have been by the **Rs** of Recycling so that it feels odd, wrong even... not to worship Christ in every area of our life.

Because we now know the **Reason** for worshipping, let's try and meet the **Requirements** for worshipping, and let's glory in the **Results** of worshipping!

PRAYER

Loving God,

we thank you for being with us this day and every day, in everything we do and say. Look upon us all favourably, wrapping us with your love and care, and help guide us along the right path.

Your path.

Give us strength to help others far more in need than us – and you know Lord that there are plenty of folk in need of our help – all known to You.

Help us to be better stewards of the planet, not only in our own daily recycling but also in our daily worship, helping others to see that there are great reasons for worship, helping us all to meet those requirements for worship, but ultimately to see the great results of our worship.

Grace and peace be with us all. Amen.


