

PILGRIM'S WAY WALK

Our walk last month was from Blairadam Forest Car Park past the outskirts of Kelty to Lochore Meadows Country Park. The latter is the scene of one of the largest land reclamation schemes ever undertaken in Britain as there were 7 pits on the site now occupied by the Park. All were closed between 1954 and 1966. Loch Ore had been drained in 1792 for agricultural purposes but the pits left behind sludge and pit waste and spoil piled up in its bed which is hard

There are, however, various reminders of the pits throughout the Park including a replica pit-winding wheel which we shall see as we exit the Park on our next walk.

Our next walk will take place on **Saturday 2 April** and is approximately 8 miles, mainly flat, with a short hill just beyond Kinglassie.

A Message from the Moderator

Dear Colleagues,

Thy Kingdom Come Global Prayer Initiative: Ascension Day to Pentecost Sunday 2022 (Thursday 26 May – Sunday 5 June)

I write to you at a time when we are especially conscious of the need for action in response to the situation in Ukraine. It is beyond the capacity of any one of us to fully comprehend the enormity of the situation and the consequences of what is taking place. Many people in our country have put concern into action by supporting agencies bringing aid to those in need in time of war and I encourage you to do so.

Alongside this, there is an accompanying action that we can all take: Prayer.

If, like me, you find it difficult to know how to pray at such a time as this, we may recall the words of the Apostle Paul and the assurance they bring: Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. (Romans 8: 26)

As we pray with frail words, the Spirit intercedes for us 'with sighs too deep for words'.

It is with a concern for prayer that I write to you to commend the *Thy Kingdom Come* Global Prayer Initiative 2022:

In November 2018, the Church of Scotland committed 'to encouraging all its parishes and people to join in *Thy Kingdom Come*' and we have done so in the years since then and I gladly do so once more.



Janet's Jottings

Spring blossoms

Like most folks, I enjoy a bit of extra 'hibernation' on winter mornings, reluctant to get out of bed when it is still dark. Lately though, it has been a joy it is to wake up to bright, sunny mornings. I open the curtains and listen to the birds singing in the two enormous horse chestnut trees that for the best part of the year are the bane of my life. In summer the leaves are so thick that little light gets into the front of my house; then in autumn, the conkers rain down like spiky canon balls and require to be raked up and taken to the tip by the carload – not my favourite job!

In spring, the buds are slow to swell and burst open. I enjoy watching them unfurl a bit more each day until the wonderful blossoms on the trees look like majestic, white candelabras



adorning the branches. Coincidentally, a friend was telling me that The Ukranian Capital of Kyiv is well known for its horse chestnut trees. They are almost as famous as the bulb

fields of Holland. Prior to the Russian invasion many tourists planned holidays to Kyiv in spring to admire them.

The chestnut tree, or 'kashtan' as Ukrainians call it, is the symbol of Kyiv. It appears everywhere – on the old 1-hryvnia coin, a bronze sculpture, on metro tokens (now a thing of the past), and on the city's coat of arms. Any song, poem or painting about Kyiv is highly likely to feature chestnuts. The Oldest chestnut tree is reputed to be over 300 years old and stands 15 metres high in the grounds of the Kitaevsky monastery; it is known as the 'Father' of all Kyiv chestnuts.



This tree was the inspiration for chestnut trees to be planted for the visit of the Russian Tsar Nikolay 1st. However, some officials felt chestnuts were too common and so the seedlings were ripped out and the more elegant poplars planted in their place. The locals picked up the discarded seedlings and it was their initiative and persistence that led to a mass planting of

boulevards, parks and gardens, therefore creating the beautiful city of blossoms.

I keep thinking about how blessed I am to be able to view chestnut trees blossom in peace. I wonder how long it will be before the citizens of Kyiv, dispersed across the world, will be able to return to view the blossoms of their chestnut trees and feel the joys of spring again



in their homeland. I shall in future count my blessings that it is only conkers that drop on me and not bombs. I urge us all to continue praying for peace across Ukraine as I leave you with the words of a short haiku-type poem written by my friend Shelagh.

The chestnuts of Kyiv clench tight in the storm's onslaught Spring comes savagely
