As this newsletter goes to print, our minister Fiona continues to be on sick leave; we send our best wishes and assure her that our thoughts and prayers are with her and her family.

At our Wednesday reflections recently, Marjorie shared thoughts prompted by a Facebook post.

I've been thinking a lot about kindness recently, about how we speak to one another, and how we treat the people around us, both those who are known to us and those who are strangers. Recently on Facebook I read something posted by a local friend, describing how a lady approached her at a meeting, saying "you won't remember me, but many years ago you were so kind and I have never forgotten it. My good friend was dying in the Hospice where you were chaplain. I was at her bedside - you visited that afternoon, then you came back in the evening and you brought me a sandwich." The writer of the post had no memory of this occasion, but she says "I'm posting this to encourage you as I was encouraged. The little things you do can mean so much more than you realise." And, to be fair, the opposite is true – the wee bit of negativity I or you emit thoughtlessly can have equally lasting ramifications.

Last year, the psychologist and broadcaster Claudia Hammond conducted the Kindness survey, in which 60,000 people participated. When asked to define kindness, the most common words used were empathy, care, thoughtfulness, love and compassion. Folk were asked to think back to when they had last received an act of kindness, and how they felt after it; not surprisingly, we get 'happy, loved, relieved and supported.'

The survey also asked "What stops you from being kind?" and acknowledged that there is a fear that the act of kindness would be misinterpreted. So being kind is risky, but the survey found that the consequence of taking that risk is very seldom negative.

Finally, the survey found (not surprisingly) that giving, receiving or witnessing an act of kindness enhances our sense of well-being; acts of kindness can be transformative, to both the giver and receiver.

None of these findings are earth-shattering discoveries, but just imagine how transformed our society – and our church – would be if we all made a conscious effort to be kinder. The Bible has plenty to say about kindness: from Proverbs "Those who are kind benefit themselves but the cruel bring ruin on themselves" In his letter to the Colossians, Paul urges them to 'put on then, as God's chosen ones, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness and patience." And last but not least, in 1 Corinthians, chapter 13, speaking of God (who is love): "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant."

So let us pray: Lord, help us to be more kind. Help us to be slower in judging or criticising others and quicker to appreciate their worth and value their contributions. Open our eyes to see the little acts of kindness we can do, and help us also to receive acts of kindness from others. Give us patience and understand-



ing. And help us also to be kind to ourselves. All of us are precious in your sight, and recipients of your loving kindness. So be with us today, in all we say and do; we pray that any kindness we do to

others, known or unknown, will always point back to you and your generous and gracious love. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen

Presbytery Mission Plan

Perth Presbytery met in Bankfoot Church Centre on Tuesday 22nd November, to discuss the final report of the Presbytery Mission Plan. As a result of decisions taken at the General Assembly in recent years. Presbyteries have had to reduce the number of ministries within their bounds. Over the last year there have been consultations with every Kirk Session and audits made of each church. Perth Presbytery has been divided into 9 networks, and we are in Network 3, along with the North Church, St John's Kirk, St Leonard's and Craigie and Moncreiffe Church. Going forward, St Matthew's has been allocated one minister in unrestricted tenure, but the expectation is that we will work closely with our neighbouring churches, in outreach and mission, and will also take some of the parish responsibilities for St John's.

The packed meeting on the 22nd November allowed questions to be asked, giving every network the chance to clarify the implications for themselves. The vote subsequently taken resulted in 68 votes for, 6 against the Plan, and it has now gone to a Central Committee for further approval. VOLUNTEERS WANTED



Over the past two years we have gifted Christmas mementos to our uniformed organisations. The first year it was advent candles; last year it was stars. This year we would like to give hearts symbolising God's love for us at Christmas.

Last year, adding ties to the stars took up a lot of time, so it would be very helpful if you can add a tie (knitted or crocheted) so that they can be handed on direct. 2. Cosy Rugs Project

Community and church groups and individuals across Perth and Kinross are being invited to help make cosy rugs for those who need them this winter. I know many of us who knit or crochet are happy to get busy in the winter evenings, and folk using Warm Spaces may like to get involved too. It's great to work together to make warm lap blankets for those who need them, and an opportunity to have a clear out of odds and ends of yarn – or I've ripped down a less than successful cardi for my first squares. We need:

- Donations of double knitting yarn and size 8 (4mm) knitting needles
- Knitted or crocheted squares (6 x 6 inches). Squares can be knitted by increasing up in every row from 1 stitch – depending on tension, going up to about 40 stitches on no 8 (4mm) needles. Knitting straight is about 28 stitches for a 6" square (or 200 stitches to knit a whole rug).
- Volunteers to help with sewing up squares to make rugs – it would be especially helpful if church groups could help with this
- Finished rugs -42 x 36 inches is very useful as a lap rug, or large square can also be a shawl, but all sizes will be welcome for families and children. These will be distributed through Warm Packs and Warm

Spaces to those who need them.

Janet's Jottings Smooring the fire

With these dark, chilly nights upon us (and the cost of heating rapidly rising!) I have been making good use of my open fire. Apart from the warmth and comfort, it also brings back memories of childhood days when an open fire was the only source of heating for the majority of houses. Everyone gathered round trying to get warm, being frequently warned by one's mother "not to sit too close or you'd end up with 'granny's (or tinker's) tartan' on your legs!" The fire was the life and soul of our house and the majority of household rubbish was burned on



it – who remembers the 'squeal' of the potato peelings as they shrivelled up in the flames?

Our fire was permanently on as it had a back burner and heated our water as well. In the winter months, on going to bed, one of my parents would 'smoor' the fire. This involved putting a big shovel full of ashes and dross on top to keep the fire tamped down until the morning, when it would be brought back to life. I loved the word 'smoor', Not so harsh as 'smothering.' It was more of a soft, comforting expression. It felt to me that it was like putting a heavy blanket over the fire and tucking it in all cosily for the night. Mum said she thought smooring came from the Gaelic, as my granny in Islay used it. One can imagine in days gone by that the fire, being the life and soul of the house, providing heat and cooking facilities, it would be essential to keep the fire going. People would nurture and nourish their fire in the hope that it would, in turn, nurture and nourish them.

It was thought that if the fire went out, then 'the soul also went out of the people of the house'. There was an elderly lady we knew, who had Irish Gaelic origins; when she smoored the fire, she would put three long, thin bits of peat over the embers. These represented the Holy Trinity. She would, as she laid each peat, say a prayer to the 'God of Life, the God of Peace and the God of Grace' before she retired to bed for the night.

The only other time I have come across the mention of 'smooring' the fire is in a Gaelic poem, which I am familiar with, but unfortunately I do not know the author. I share it with you now, praying we all keep warm this winter, and that the blessings of the Christmas Season and the warmth of love that Christ brings to us all will be rekindled in the New Year.






Boys Breakfast Blether
