I would like to offer particular thanks to Chrissie and Chris for generously offering us the use of their incredible gardens and all the team who worked so hard to make this event a success. Throughout the glorious afternoon, I spoke to many different people as we appreciated the colours and textures of the lovingly nurtured gardens together. I was especially happy to meet Lilia, Sergei, Sophia and David – a Ukrainian family who have been making Scotland their home from home for the past few months. (I didn't meet their other son Peter who was busy having fun with friends elsewhere in the five acre garden.) I was blessed to try some sweets Lilia made and watching Calum and Sophia playing with bubbles together made my day. Sergei spoke of their gratitude about having a new start and new opportunities. Even as I chatted with them and thought about everything they have been through, I was struck by our similarities too – we all wanted to ensure our children had the best opportunities possible in life. It made me realise that this is what God wants for all his children: the opportunity to live life in all its fulness.

Having a different perspective can teach us more about God. His presence can be found in many weird and wonderful places... and people, for that matter! Blessings can be found in even the darkest of places. We can come to know him more through other people, other cultures, and various artistic expressions. Come to think of it – we can get to know and understand ourselves better too.

So widen your horizons. Change your perspective. Challenge yourself with something new this summer. And find God in surprising places. May the God of adventure go with you.

THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

We thank Fiona Bruce who recently offered the following as her contribution to our weekly Wednesday morning reflections on Zoom.....

My "Thought for Today" is "books" – in particular the Bible as a book. This is largely because we have just returned from the Melrose Book Festival so books were uppermost in our minds!

One of the best speakers, Robin Ince, who fronts "The Infinite Monkey Cage" on a Saturday evening with Brian Cox on Radio 4, reminded us that humans are the only beings who transmit their thoughts onto paper- and he encouraged everyone to write!

Books are many things to many people- they can be a source of comfort, a source of inspiration and of guidance. And so with the Bible- the Book we as Christians look to for the same reasons. "This Is The Day", a book of readings and meditations from the lona Community relates the story of an African woman who summed up the Bible thus: "Other books I read. This book reads me".

That book also talks about the Bible as "Revolution as well as revelation". "How the theme of social justice echoes through the pages of scripture like an insistent drum-beat " and "stands all worldly values on their head. However marginal an interest in social justice and political issues may sometimes seem to the mainstream of church life..." historians can talk about the various books which came together to form the Bible as we know it today, but I'd like to concentrate on the language of the Bible. For example, the late Rev David Ogston, himself a great wordsmith, talks about how the Psalms touch heaven and earth. He writes they have given us a "devotional vocabulary". "If they teach us remorse- the searching of the heart; if they keep us towards adoration- the lifting of the heart; if they introduce us to wonder- the broadening of the heart..." Yet the Psalms also teach us of the misery of the hunted, loneliness, betrayal and the pain of the Cross.

The other thought I'd like to leave you with is also from the lona meditations and it is this: "Someone once said they were not worried by the parts of the Bible they did not understand. What did bother them was the parts they did understand...the parts that are so clear ... such as the Beatitudes and some other parts of the Sermon on the Mount...for the only way to avoid the challenge of such passages is to pretend that Jesus meant something else or that, for some reason, what he says does not apply to us." Anyhow, these are just a few thoughts on our Book, the Bible. Its language and its meaning have the power to fire our imagination and search the heart, lift the heart and broaden the heart.
