Letter from the Manse



Friends, in our house this year, Advent has already begun. We've been to the school Christmas Fair and we've built our first snowman. Calum is getting ready for his first school nativity and we're finding opportunities to practise the songs everywhere: in the car, in the bath, in coffee shops and playgrounds. I'm going to have to Sellotape my mouth shut when it comes to the actual performances so I don't join in! Yes, we're definitely getting prepared for Christmas and it's not quite December yet...not even Advent yet.

In the midst of all the 'stuff' of preparing for Christmas, I love the Advent season. Sometimes it's the anticipation, sometimes the waiting, sometimes the preparing that draws me to this season. This year, it's the sense of longing that has captured me. What are you longing for? I long for Christ to break into this broken world afresh through us, sending us to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to set people free from their prisons, and to comfort those who mourn, just as we read about in Isaiah chapter 61. In the world, I long for peace, acceptance and love to be the values by which we all live together. In our country, I long for people to be treated equitably so that everyone might be afforded the right opportunities and resources for them to flourish. In our city, I long for homelessness and struggles with addiction to become a thing of the past and for asylum-seekers and refugees to have a better quality of life that allows them to live rather than simply exist. In my family, it's hard not to long for better times, when Mum was still with us and we were able to celebrate chaotically together, but I long for plenty of opportunities to make memories. When it comes to our church family, I long for us to be a people of gathering in and sending out. I long for the church to be a place where we can gather to learn together, to encourage one another and to praise God together so that, filled up, we can go out into our ordinary lives and share God's love with more people. Please don't think that I am writing this to other people and not you - it takes all of us together.

Take the nativity story. It needs every single one of the characters to make it the treasured story shared over the centuries. Obviously, Jesus is a very important character but who would he be without Mary and Joseph, who welcomed him, raised him and loved him? Without the innkeepers who said, "no room at the inn," Jesus would not have had the most humble of beginnings. Jesus was born in a Travelodge doesn't quite have the same ring to it. Without the sheep, the shepherds would not have been out on the hillside. Would they have been alerted to the angel-song if they'd been at home? Without the animals, there would have been no manger in which to lay the newborn baby. Without the star, would the magi have made the journey? No matter the details of the story itself, it would not be the story we love and love to share without each and every character. The people who witnessed this great wonder then took their stories out into their lives and they not only told them to others but showed the impact of the birth of Jesus through their way of living. And this is God's challenge to us too: how will we take seriously our particular parts in the living-out and sharing of the Christmas story?

So while you make your Christmas plans and get stressed over the right presents or food, how to fit everyone in or how to make Christmas special on your own, please remember that you are a special part of the Christmas story too. For at Christmas, we celebrate how Jesus came to this world and continues to come to this world in our hearts and through our lives. May you know that you are part of God's plan to share his love with the whole world. May you be empowered to share this message in the way only you can. May you know that you are loved and treasured by your Church family, not only at Christmas but all the year through. You are one of a kind and we need you. Without you, St Matthew's would not be the warm, welcoming, supportive, encouraging, transformative church family we are today and will be into the future.

Friends, I give thanks for each and every one of you. I wish you a meaningful Christmas and a New Year that is full of peace and joy when it comes. I look forward to our opportunities to gather from near and afar this Advent and Christmas and hope to see you at our services and events along with those you are inspired to invite.

Sunday 1st December, 11.00, Worship for First Sunday in Advent

Sunday 8th December, 11.00, A Time to Remember service:

This quieter, reflective service gives us permission to step outside the joy of Christmas and sit with the other emotions we experience at this time of year. There will be opportunities to light candles or add a name to our Tree of Remembrance, as we remember those who have died and who we miss at Christmas. Sunday 15th December, 11.00, Worship for the Third Sunday in Advent

Each day from Monday 16th to Friday 20th December: 09.30 Advent reflections:
