Rev. Fiona reflects

Friends, for fifteen weeks in 1994, the band Wet Wet Wet held the number one slot in the UK charts with their version of "Love is all around." Part of the soundtrack of the much beloved film, "Four Weddings and a Funeral," you could not escape the song no matter how hard you tried. I seem to recall that eventually Wet Wet Wet themselves asked for folk to stop buying it because they were sick of hearing it – or was that an urban myth? It probably took the next ten years to get the song out of our heads and off the playlists of radio DJs and then...it was used as the basis of a song in another Richard Curtis movie: the song was "Christmas is all around" and the film, "Love Actually." And so the earworm began again. As it says in the film, "Love actually is all around." We couldn't escape the songs and we couldn't escape the films. If it wasn't people talking about them, it was folk quoting from them. Yet, here's my confession...I loved both of them because they really were about love – all sorts of love: romantic love, familial love, friendship love, unrequited love, self-love. These films made us look at our own lives and recognise the love we were shown and the love we had to show. We all became part of a great love story in our communities and across the globe in response.

Our new Moderator of the General Assembly, the Right Reverend Rosie Frew, chose as her theme for the year, "Extravagant love." It is drawn from the letter to the Ephesians in the New Testament of the Bible, which talks about how broad and long and high and deep God's love is. How can we as individuals and as a church show God's extravagant love to the world? The simple truth is this – we can learn from the example of "Love is all around" and just keep



playing the same record. We can keep loving each other. We can continue to love the strangers in our midst, the folk seeking a home or a spiritual home or a family to whom they can belong. We can demonstrate love by sharing what we have with the hungry and those who are in need in many different, complex ways. We can choose to offer a warm welcome and to quietly notice when others need to talk or need a hug. We can love-bomb our communities by showing love in every conceivable way, without limit and without prejudice.

In this past week, I have noticed that love lives throughout my life. I paid more attention to it. I saw it in the care a mother offered her baby in the vestry as we spoke about baptism and in the absolute trust and devotion of the little one as she snuggled right into Mummy. I witnessed it in a couple who will soon be married – in the knowing looks that passed between them and the gentle touches of comfort and support. In pastoral encounters, I saw God reach out in love and care to those who needed to know that God was indeed right there with them. I saw generosity bring smiles through sweeties given and shared. I was reminded that I too need care, as I shared a meal with a friend who ministered to me. Love is all around. Extravagant love is all around.

So here is this month's challenge: love extravagantly. Love without counting the cost. Love with all that you are and all that you have. And when you think that you are running out, let the Holy Spirit fill you up with more love to share. At the end of the day, the cup is not

half-full nor half-empty, it is a cup that can be filled over and over again (with coffee or other beverages). We are the same: vessels that can be filled with love to pour out over and over. Let's share love and receive love this month but more than that, let's choose to notice love at work in our lives and our communities and let's thank God for it.

A garden for life

It all began with a garden. In Genesis, we read that God had no sooner created the heavens and the earth, when He set about making a garden. A beautiful place, a picture-perfect paradise; symbolising peace, beauty and abundance. It was full of flowers, trees, plants, rivers and everything to sustain life. He



gave this garden to Adam and Eve to live in. However, as we know, due to human curiosity, an apple and a crafty serpent, it very quickly 'went pear-shaped', as the saying goes.

Since then, folks throughout the world, have had a fascination for gardens, producing amazingly creative places for enjoyment, relaxation and growing of food, as well as spaces to exhibit sculptures and artworks. From the ancient Hanging Gardens of Babylon to the Gardens at Versailles, or our own wee Branklyn gardens here in Perth, we are reminded that gardens have a special place in our hearts.

I too, love gardens. This passion took me and my friend Fiona Bruce, off to London last week for a visit to the Chelsea flower show. We went not just to experience the whole show for the first time, but on a special mission to support Down's Syndrome Scotland (DSS), who had created a garden for entry into the small gardens section. Created by Duncan Hall & Nick Burton, the garden celebrates some of the many wonderful qualities (or 'superpowers'), that people with Down's syndrome possess. Their sense of fun & mischief, immense capacity for care & compassion, affection, sensitivity & empathy. Down's syndrome is caused by an extra copy of chromosome 21 in a person's cells. This and other aspects of DS were reflected in subtle ways in the garden. The curved oak benches had 21 slats. The pool appeared a barrier, but had a hidden walkway; thus, reflecting the barriers, prejudices and misunderstandings, often faced by people who have DS and how they can be overcome. My favourite were the 2 large cauldrons of water which contained



secret, water jets, which sporadically squirted water at innocent passers-by – a hint of the impulsive fun and mischief some people with DS might like to get up to!

The judges were also impressed by the garden, as they awarded it a 'Silver-Gilt' medal and then later it was also awarded the 'People's Choice' award. A testament to the creativity of the designers, as well as valuing the contribution that people with DS bring to our lives.

I leave you with the words of an anonymous wee poem on a mug that I own *"The kiss of the sun for the pardon, the song of the birds for mirth. One is nearer God's heart in a garden, than anywhere else on earth".* I hope you will find some time to enjoy a garden this summer.
