Rev. Fiona reflects

Friends, as I write this, we've just journeyed through a thoughtful and moving Holy Week and Easter at St Matthew's. It has been a time of reflection, honesty and vulnerability, as we have chosen to discuss and explore our faith together. I have found this refreshing and challenging at the same time. There has been a lot to think about. In our Holy Week reflections, those leading grappled with various parts of the Easter story and the characters involved as well as exploring what faith is. There was much to feed the mind as well as our bodies being well-fed with bacon rolls and egg rolls and plentiful tea and coffee.



On Thursday, I found it incredibly moving to share Communion together around the same tables at which we'd shared breakfast. We had a wonderful Passion trail in the church, which provided a chance to interact with the stories we have been telling across the week. Our 'Faith Natters at Easter' session on Good Friday only convinced me further that we need another series of Faith Natters. At the PACT Walk of Witness on Good Friday and the Easter Day dawn service at Quarrymill, it was encouraging to join with Christians from various churches across the city.

On Easter morning at St Matthew's, I found myself wondering what on earth I was going to do with the hundreds of chocolate eggs that had been donated but I needn't have worried – the church was packed and everyone who enjoys

chocolate went away with several eggs (if they hadn't eaten them during the service!). We shared Communion together along with the assurance that none of us have all the answers when it comes to faith. It was a real time of celebration and joy. I offer heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the Holy Week and Easter programmes and a special thanks to my 'coffee angel.'

And so we find ourselves in the post-Easter Day phase – we're still in the season of Easter but left feeling a bit like the first disciples did and wondering, 'what next?' Well, I'd love for us to continue our exploration of faith and life together. For the next four weeks, Thursday is going to become a contact point in the week. From 10.00 until 14.00, a prayer space will be open in the Session Room. From 10.30-12.00, I will be available at the church for anyone who would like to have a chat. There is no need to make an appointment but if demand is high, you



may need to wait your turn. Faith Natters will return for four weeks, beginning on Thursday 1st May from 14.00-15.30 in the Session Room. For those who are not familiar with it, Faith Natters creates a safe space to discuss the questions you have about faith, religion and life in general. There is no fixed format but there is gentle moderation to ensure that everyone who wishes has the chance to speak. We accept that we will not agree on every matter but we commit to listen and engage with respect and openness. All are welcome.

In this Easter season, we will continue to build our Teams and we will be approaching individuals with a view to increasing our Eldership. I will also be running some sessions for those who might be interested in church membership – do get in touch if you'd like to know more. And we'll be working with our friends from Perth: North Church and St John's Kirk to plan an outdoor service of worship on the afternoon of Pentecost, Sunday 8th June.



Someone asked me this week if my diary was less busy now that Easter is past – I'm not sure about that but I do have time available. So please get in touch if you'd value a chat or if you know of someone in need who would appreciate a visit or phone call.

As 'Resurrection people with Easter in our hearts,' let's continue to explore our faith together and look for ways to support one another on our faith journeys. And let's invite others to be part of the 'gathering in' at St Matthew's Church.

Believing v. Relationship

An excerpt from a reflection presented on Good Friday 2025 by Maureen Pearson

Some approaches to being Christian focus on following the rules and on being 'good.' Yet a focus on being good is often misdirected into a legalism that makes one's acceptability conditional – God's willingness to be in relationship with us is reduced to a measure of how well we adhere to a set of rules.

When an American evangelist John Paton tried to translate the New Testament into the indigenous language of the people to whom he was sent as a missionary, he ran into a snag: there was no word for 'believe' in the people's language. When one of the natives came in, he sat down, stretched out and rested his legs on another chair. Relaxed, he commented on how good it felt to 'lean his whole weight' on those chairs. Immediately Paton knew he had the word he would use for 'believe': 'to lean one's whole weight on.'

Similarly, the Greek and Latin roots of the word 'believe' mean 'to give one's heart to.'
Believing doesn't necessarily mean giving one's mental assent but something deeper – giving one's self at the deepest level. In our friendships and relationships with others, we don't 'believe' in the other person (at least not the way we talk about 'believing' in God) – we are in a dynamic, fluid relationship. We learn

more all the time, depend on one another, learn to give and take, and spend time with one another out of sheer enjoyment.

Believing does not mean putting your allegiance in one another with a set of doctrines or teachings: it means moving from a second-hand religion of following rules to a religion of relationship. We learn from having heard about Jesus to being in a dynamic and fluid relationship with the Spirit of Christ. The day of Christians living in fear, intimidated by some vague sense of guilt that our Creator is waiting to punish us somehow, is obsolete. We have something other than fear to 'lean our whole weight on.'

St Matthew's Church Benevolent Fund.

We often refer to ourselves in St Matthew's as a church family. Like any family we share each other's joys and sorrows, celebrating and supporting the fellow members of our faith community. Like all families, from time to time someone may be having a rough time and could do with a little extra support; this can be offered in different ways – through prayer, or a kindly word, or a bowl of soup! We want to remind you that St Matthew's also has a Benevolent Fund, which can offer financial help.

This is a fund which we have had (and used) for many years — it is ring-fenced specifically for benevolent purposes, and has been able to help people when they find themselves in straitened circumstances, which can cause them great anxiety or distress — perhaps an unexpected expense has derailed any budgeting, or a person has found themselves unemployed or unable to work because of illness but they still face big bills.

Our Benevolent Fund has been able to offer support to individuals in such circumstances. Other ways in which the Benevolent Fund has benefitted the congregation include making a substantial donation towards the Church refurbishment project and building of the ramp outside the church to facilitate easier entry to those with decreased mobility, giving financial assistance towards improving the AV system which allows the morning service to be streamed for those who are house-bound, or can't get to church, and in funding the creation of the church flat as a holiday let to provide a valuable additional income stream to the Church, and which, from time to time, can be offered for respite for carers as well.

You probably won't be much aware of our Benevolent Fund because, as you would expect, grants are given in strict confidentiality. A report goes to the Kirk Session each year, but no names are included. The Fund is in the care of a few Custodians, drawn from the eldership and including the Minister.

Applications are treated confidentially and can be submitted on a relatively simple form; we have left a few of these forms in the foyer of the church, and there are some in the church office too.

Where's the Evidence?

Recently I took myself off to the 'pictures' (for those of the younger generation, replace with the word 'Movies'!), being a regular cinema goer, I always enjoy the experience of watching a film on the big screen. On this occasion, it was to see the story of a remarkable man of whom I have admired since I read some of his quotes as a teenager.

The film 'Bonhoeffer' is the story of Deitrich Bonhoeffer, a German Christian, whose strong faith and determination to love his neighbour, went against all that the Nazi regime promoted. Deitrich became a Lutheran pastor and theologian. His many insightful quotes, particularly on faith, obedience, and the importance of action in the face of evil, are still well known today.

He was arrested for speaking out against the hatred and towards Jews, disabled people, homosexuals, gypsies and humanity in general. As a committed Christian, he felt he could never swear an oath to follow Hitler and stated that "Christ was the head of the church, not the Fuhrer". He was the head of an underground seminary training pastors for the Confessing Church, which was eventually shut down by the Gestapo. In protestation, he served as courier for the German resistance. Risking his life, he supplied information to people in Britain and America informing them of the atrocities and murders of people being held in the death camps.

Bonhoeffer was arrested by the Nazis in 1943, but even from prison, he continued his Christian outreach. This included witnessing to his guards, some of whom smuggled his writings out of prison. On 9th April 1945 he was executed, by hanging - without any trial or evidence against him. He witnessed his faith and promoted the love of Christ to the end of his life.

What courage he had. How many of us would have had that same courage when facing such adversity. Would we be able to admit to being Christians and hold steadfastly to our beliefs knowing our lives were in danger? This sign often seen outside a church, may give us food for thought

and we thank you. and we thank you.


