St Matthew's Church in Perth is a Church of Scotland Congregation. We are Presbyterian Church and we are part of the Presbytery of Perth.


All are welcome at St Matthew's.

Janet's Jottings The beacon of light

I have not long returned from my annual holiday to the Isle of Islay. As always, I had an enjoyable time relaxing, walking, watching wildlife and catching up with a few friends. It happened that my visit coincided with the 200-year celebration to commemorate the building of the lighthouse, which sits on Orsay, on the Rhinns of Islay.

The lighthouse was established in 1825 and engineered by Robert Stevenson. It stands 29 metres tall and there are 131 steps to the top of tower. This I can



testify to, as I have climbed them all! When I was young, the lighthouse was still manned and the lighthouse keepers welcomed visitors, especially children. We were encouraged to count the steps as we climbed upwards. Every year, I got frustrated as I began to lose count as I neared the top. The jovial lighthouse keeper would say "Och, well, you'll just have to come back next year and count them all again!" Sadly, it is now automated and so I can no longer go and recount the steps.

The bright light is a fascination for me, but a necessity for locals and seafarers. This was evident during the celebrations, which lasted a whole weekend. It started with a ceilidh on the Friday night, then a family gala day, lighthouse exhibition and a story telling session on Saturday. Sunday began with a special ecumenical church service and culminated in a massive street party with stalls, entertainment, fresh seafood, live music and dancing. It was clear that the lighthouse has played a major role in the lives of the island people. It is a permanent fixture, a living being, a neighbour and of course a saviour. Knowing that its presence has brought many of their own fishermen home safely and helped others to navigate through stormy waters, they wanted to show their appreciation and love for it.

In the church service, we sang several appropriate hymns, including 'Shine Jesus shine, Christ be our light, also one that wasn't familiar to me called 'My lighthouse' written by Rend Collective. I found the words very comforting and so would like to share them with you here.

In my wrestling and in my doubts, In my failures You won't walk out. Your great love will lead me through; You are the peace in my troubled sea. In the silence you won't let go.
In the questions your truth will hold.
Your great love will lead me through;
You are the peace in my troubled sea.

The different preachers focused on the verse **John 8:12** in which Jesus states "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life".

What a reassuring thought. No matter how tough things get, how dark and despairing our days may be, or if we are feeling adrift in our lives, there **is** a light to guide us to safety. Jesus is our personal lighthouse, very much needed in this world of darkness, uncertainty, war and division. So, in the words of Graham Kendrick's hymn let us ask the light of the world to "Shine Jesus shine, fill this land with the Father's glory. Blaze, Spirit blaze, set our hearts on fire......"

HOWMORE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, SOUTH UIST

On a recent holiday visit to South Uist we came across this church which is reputed to have the longest central Communion table in Scotland and which effectively splits the church lengthways in two!

Howmore Church is one of two churches serving the Church of Scotland's South Uist Parish.

It was built in 1858, the latest in a long series of churches and chapels to have stood in Howmore. The remains of most



of the others stand a little to the east, beyond the crofters' hostel. These include the largest, St Mary's or Teampull Mor.

Though not obvious from the Ordnance Survey map, Howmore Church stands on slightly higher ground than its immediate surroundings. Combined with its white harled exterior, this makes it visible from a considerable distance away, especially from the south. It has also traditionally been used as a landmark by fishermen off the west coast of South Uist.


St Matthew's walkers. In August, we much enjoyed a meditative walk from Dunkeld Cathedral, led by
