Rev. Fiona reflects

Friends, during worship earlier this month, I was reflecting on birthday parties and who to invite. He had a bouncy castle, a Nerf wall, temporary tattoos, and colouring in, along with a whole range of party food and a delicious cake his Dad baked (Ian is an amazing baker as well as an amazing artist!). For two hours, I lived on my nerves in a noisy hall full of happy children. The whole time I was thinking how lovely it was that Calum didn't want to leave anyone out. But I also noticed something else

Session Clerk's Round-up

We are delighted to welcome Craig Robson as our new Treasurer. Craig and Norma recently joined us from Mid Strathearn Church, and he responded to appeal in the Church Family News one Sunday morning; discussions ensued with John Dewar, and now John can properly enjoy his retirement. We thank both of them, and we look forward to working with Craig. We also welcome Rae Simmonds as our new Safeguarding Officer, with thanks to Andy Turnbull who has diligently performed that role for the last number of years.

We look forward also to welcoming new elders to our Kirk Session; six of them will be ordained and admitted at our service on Sunday 5th October, and we know they will bring a wealth of experience and expertise to our Kirk Session. (And there are more in the pipeline!)

As our congregation continues to grow, it is good to welcome new faces. Remembering names can be a challenge though. So, prompted by our Pastoral Care Team, we will be inviting those attending worship to wear name badges on occasional Sundays. You may already have noticed that the Welcome Teams are already wearing them. Hopefully, this will help all of us to put names to faces which we already know well, but whose names escape us!

Looking after our church building is always on the agenda of Kirk Session meetings. We are relieved that all the scaffolding is now away, with remedial work on our stonework and roof now successfully completed. This was a massive piece of work, and huge thanks to Raymond Young who not only supervised it all, and negotiated contracts, but also secured grants to cover the not insignificant costs. We are very grateful to the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland for their grant of £170,000, and to the Listed Places of Worship for their grant of £30,000. However, there is still a shortfall of nearly £8000, and the Session has agreed that approaches will be made to regular users of our facilities, as well as to local grant-making bodies to help us raise the amount needed.

A welcome approach has been made by the Scouts who are keen to raise money for a defibrillator for St Matthew's; Eric Duff is working with them, and our hope is that a defibrillator can be located outside so that it is a community asset.

The Kirk Session is also currently working on the final report from the Local Church Review for Presbytery, and there are early discussions regarding the revised Presbytery Mission Plan, which would have implications for St Matthew's – watch this space!


Whilst the footfall was less than expected, possibly due to the wet and windy weather on the Saturday, anyone visiting received a warm welcome from the team.

Are you ready to make a commitment?

At St Matthew's Church, we love to welcome new members of the church family. We do that each time someone engages in the life of the church, whether through our services of worship or our events, and that's great. However, did you know that you can make a further commitment? We sometimes call this 'becoming a member' or confirmation by profession of faith. Some people think of this step as choosing to sign the blank cheque that was written at the time of your infant baptism (if that was the case) – instead of parents/grandparents making vows about beliefs and commitment, you have the opportunity to do this for yourself. It is an incredibly moving moment. It also results in your details being held in our membership roll and it allows you the right to vote on particular church matters, like when it comes to appointing a new Minister (hopefully not any time soon!).

To find out more about the church and making such a commitment, I have scheduled four sessions based on the 'ABC of Discipleship' materials from Thursday 30th October at 19.00 and meeting weekly. These sessions will explore what it means to be a disciple and to 'join the church' as well as covering the vows which will be made. There is no requirement to attend the full course, and they will be open to anyone who is interested. Following the 'membership classes,' participants will have the opportunity to be confirmed by

public confession of faith during worship on the first Sunday of Advent, 30th November, when we reflect on hope.
