Rev. Fiona reflects

As much as we did not pick either tatties or pumpkins, we did come together as a family to share quality time. Our holiday at 'Hamelldaeme' was full of cosy, lazy mornings; film nights; playing games together; going on adventures; and spending time with friends and family. It was a chance to set aside the 'to-do list' and exchange it for a 'what do we want to do list.' It was brilliant. We all feel the benefit of the break, which I was able to have through the support of others, so I want to thank Rev. Barbara Quigley for her poignant worship, Rev. Sandy Gunn for

providing pastoral cover and our Session Clerk, Marjorie Clark for holding the fort.



During the holiday, Calum developed an interest in Harry Potter for the first time. Now I have to admit that I personally have not read the books — I did try the first one but it wasn't my cup of tea. However, I find the films captivating so we decided to watch them together. They are, quite simply, magical. It's not just the development of the characters or the mind-boggling variety of fantastical creatures or unpronounceable spells. I'm drawn to the constant theme of light and dark that weaves its way through the story. This seemed particularly appropriate to me last Sunday afternoon following the clocks going back — where on earth did that daylight go?

It is easy on the face of it to think that some characters in Harry Potter are 'goodies' whilst others are 'baddies,' but life is rarely so simple. Instead, each and every character is a complex mix of light and dark, as they strive to discover who they really are. Which voices will they listen to? What will they allow to influence them? Who do they want to be? What would they like their legacy to be? It may be a fantasy world but it's not so different to real life. In our complex world and challenging political climate, it's all too easy to draw thick lines between light and dark, 'goodie' and 'baddie.' We can be drawn into designating someone as 'other' due to differences of opinion, or because others look or act differently to us. So often we find that those who shout loudest about others are actually those who are not having their own needs met and are scared about the future. As they say, 'hurt people hurt people.' Yet underneath it all, aside from perceived or real differences, there lies a shared humanity and a shared experience of the battle between light and darkness, hope and struggle, in all of us.

In his ministry, Jesus saw beyond it all and reached out to those in need whoever they were and whatever labels others placed on them. He sought out the lost and the lonely and brought them back into relationship. As Christians, we have many, many opportunities in life to do likewise. We can help people to remember their own humanity and to see the humanity in others, if only we can see our own first. Jesus offered kindness, gentleness and grace through humility, but he also called out what was wrong in society. It's a great example for us to follow.

Later this week, some folk will celebrate Halloween. Amid the darkness, lights will shine from lanterns made of pumpkins or neeps. The next day we will be reminded of all the saints – those who have gone on before us and who illuminated the path for us. And before we know it, Christmas lights and decorations

will adorn our homes and our city. As we see these lights, may we be reminded to shine our light brightly in the darkness – we never know when someone else might need it!

I'd like to end my message with words from a powerful statement of faith written by Bruce Prewer. "We choose to believe that light is better than darkness, sharing is better than hoarding, truth is better than deceit, mercy is better than revenge, love is better than indifference, God is stronger than chaos. We choose to have faith in the God who is love." May we continue to reflect God's love and light to the world.

Save the Date - Burns Supper 2026


The St Matthews Burns Supper 2026 will be held on Saturday 31st January 2026 at 6:30 for 7pm in The Main Church Hall.

YOUR CHURCH NEEDS YOU – GIFT MONTH IN NOVEMBER

Yes, and there is no apology for having another Gift Month this year. The facts are quite simple. Rising costs – including energy – are not just affecting us as individuals. It affects what we in St Matthew's can do.

Once again, we are heading for a deficit in 2025 – our income is less than our expenditure. The Session has set a very strict set of rules to rein in expenditure as much as possible. The work being done on the outside of the building earlier this year was funded by grants which came from the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland, and vital repairs on the manse are being funded by grants from Presbytery and the General Trustees.

At our Annual Stated meeting in October, Raymond Young reported that while our income was up last year, our expenditure had increased by more than our income, with the result that our 2024 accounts show a deficit of £7798. The main causes were an increase of 21% in our Giving to Grow contribution to the central church, and heating and lighting costs which rose by 73%. With our reserves depleted because of the refurbishment, the Benevolent Fund had helped out with a loan of £10,000. Going forward, a major priority of the Finance team is to revisit the costs for our hall lets; and we are of course very grateful to all who, over the past year have raised funds for the church through particular initiatives – Janet's Jam Jar challenge, David and Michael's Flanders and Swann evening, and most recently, Debbie's Green Knight, to name but a few. However, more is needed to build up our reserves, which is why the Kirk Session has designated November as a Gift Month.

So we are therefore asking you – once again – to treat November as a special Gift Month for extra giving. Please donate whatever they feel able to give to allow St. Matthew's to continue to flourish. We realise that times are hard for everyone but please give as generously as you are able.

If at all possible, we would ask that your gift be made by BACS transfer, marking it "Gift Month" to the following account:- Account Name: St. Matthew's Church Sort Code: 83-47-00 Account Number: 00760133

If you are unable to make your donation in this way you can do so by cheque or cash in the offering plate on any Sunday or by sending your donation to St. Matthew's Church, Tay Street, Perth PH1 5LQ. Your donation can also be made using the card machine situated at the front of the church as you enter. Paying by these methods can also be done with Gift Aid added. If using the blue envelopes or the card reader you can do so by entering the appropriate details. If you are a taxpayer but have not previously registered for the Gift Aid scheme please consider doing so now.

We would also ask all members who are able to consider increasing their current regular givings by standing order or whichever method you use. If you wish to pay by bank standing order the account details are as above. If you are a taxpayer please consider making your donation under Gift Aid. This does not cost you any more but allows the church to reclaim the tax amount equivalent to 25% of your givings.

If we cannot increase our income significantly then the long term future of St. Matthew's Church may be in doubt. For this reason we would ask that you give this article serious thought and prayer.



Kirk Session Update

We are delighted to welcome eight new elders, who were ordained and admitted at the morning service on Sunday 5th October. We look forward to their contributions to the smooth running of our church. At the same service, we held our Annual Stated Meeting, during which Fiona reflected over the past twelve months, and looked forward to the growing life of our church family, and the future. There's a lot going on. Talking of which – the revised Presbytery Mission Plan now envisages a union of St Matthew's Church with Craigie and Moncreiffe Church. The proposed plan sees the continued use of both buildings, and a team ministry of 1.5 people, with Fiona as the full-time part of that ministry. Obviously, there is much to discuss about the implications, challenges and opportunities which such a union would present. Our Kirk Session has already met with Presbytery representatives, for preliminary questions, and the next step is to have discussions with the Kirk Session of Craigie and Moncreiffe Church – we will keep you updated as to the progress of these discussions.

Finally, approval has been given, and funding sourced, for necessary repairs to the manse; please keep Fiona and her family in your prayers as they cope over the next weeks and months with the disruption which house repairs inevitably incur!

Church membership at St Matthew's

At St Matthew's Church, we love to welcome new members of the church family. We do that each time someone engages in the life of the church, whether through our services of worship or our events, and that's great. However, did you know that you can make a further commitment? We sometimes call this 'becoming a member' or confirmation by profession of faith. Some people think of this step as choosing to sign the blank cheque that was written at the time of your infant baptism (if that was the case) – instead of parents/grandparents making vows about beliefs and commitment, you now have the opportunity to do this for yourself. It is an incredibly moving moment. It also results in your details being held in our membership roll and it allows you the right to vote on particular church matters, like when it comes to appointing a new Minister (hopefully not any time soon!).

To find out more about the church and making such a commitment, I have scheduled four sessions based on the 'ABC of Discipleship' materials from **Thursday 6th November at 19.00** and meeting weekly – **please note this revised start date**. These sessions will explore the themes of acceptance, belonging, commitment and what it means to be a disciple (follower of Jesus) as well as covering the vows made when we become church members. There is no requirement to attend the full course – each session will be open to anyone who is interested. Following the 'membership classes,' participants will have the opportunity to be confirmed by public confession of faith during worship on the first Sunday of Advent, 30th November, when we reflect on hope. Where were you born/brought up?


